Late in 1945 a vertical hole was drilled in the southwestern corner of the Langdon claim, at a point 300 feet north 85 degrees east from that corner. This hole was drilled to 900 feet and lost, and a second vertical hole started at the same location.

This hole was drilled to a depth of 2,000 feet. The hole passed through a succession of contorted cherty argillites, greenstone, lava, and black serpentine, all belonging to the Fergusson group.
