Dear Sir,

I am herewith enclosing <sup>M</sup>  
a sketch plan and map of a group of claims  
and two Crown Grants that J. W. Morrison  
of Shoal Bay and myself own in  
equal partnership.

These claims as you will note  
are situated between Phillips Arm  
and Loughboro Inlet, on the Grey's  
Creek, Loughboro slope of the Pembroke Range,  
North-westerly from the Doratha Morton  
and adjoining claims.

The "Champions" lot 276 and "Commonwealth"  
lot <sup>277</sup> 277 were Crown Grants in 1898 and

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as far as we can determine there has been no work of any kind done on the property since that time.

We cannot learn who did the work from any records so far, including the Annual Reports of the Minister of Mines.

The South-African Gold Field, Ltd were operating the Rosetta Morton property at that time, but we learn if they had anything to do with this property or not.

The plan of the underground workings and surveys was made by myself with the assistance of Morrison, and I vouch for it being substantially correct.

I am not a Mining Eng'g but I am in another branch of the Engineering work.

The ore-body being so large, much of it is sparsely mineralized and the average values of the channel samples we took were low; ranging from #1.12 across 16½ ft to #22.12 across 4 ft.

We cannot afford to engage an Engineer to make a thorough examination and report on the property at the present time: and would be greatly assisted, and appreciate it very much if you could send an engineer sometime in the near future to make an examination and report on it.

It is definitely traceable for 4000 or more by strappings, open-cuts etc. north-westerly and out-croppings for a similar distance south-easterly.

It is on the same formation and strike as the Roratha Morton, but the ore is different. The ore is of the <sup>organic</sup> icy, or glassy nature.

I have read Bulletin No 20, Part 4 by Dr. Stevenson and note that he refers to this particular area as being favorable for further prospecting.

I remember of having met and talked to you at Shoal Bay a few

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years ago when you were up  
there inspecting the Douglas Pine  
etc.

I trust you may be able to give  
them your early attention.
