Re: Specific Project Burn

I have been quite busy on affairs of the LUC Syndicate and have not made the opportunity to get in touch with you. This letter is largely to rectify this situation, as the next quarterly report is still a couple of weeks away.

We have been drilling ahead on Burn, investigating the very large molybdenum anomaly obtained last year. We have drilled seven holes for a total footage of 2700° and are gradually feeling our way to the more promising parts of the anomaly. I might describe the situation as neither particularly encouraging or too discouraging at the moment. We have intersected molybdenum in three of the holes but not in economic quantities.

Trevor Horsley of Conwest visited the property about two weeks ago and was in to see me in Vancouver yesterday. Mr. Redpath, President of Dome, and Dr. Watson, Consultant, spent a couple of days on the property and also discussed the program with me in Vancouver. The general consensus is that we must press on with more holes in order to determine the source of the high molybdenum values in the soil.

A summary of the results to date will be in the third quarterly report which will be issued early in October. If, however, you wish any information prior to this time, please advise me. I would also suggest that you may wish to confer with Mr. Redpath or Mr. Horsley.
