
I appreciate hearing your concern with the open-pit copper mining proposal by Geddes Resources LTD. in Northwestern British Columbia, Canada. I have been contacted by a number of individuals who share your concern with this proposal.

I have asked the company, the Alaska State Department of Natural Resources, and the City of Haines to explain the benefits of the project, and asked the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), the United States Fish and Wildlife Service (US F&W), and the National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS), to evaluate its potential environmental impacts. I feel that this information will prove helpful in weighing the impacts and benefits of this proposal for the affected communities in Southeast Alaska.

While it is clear that spinoff economic growth from this project will occur, it is important that we look at the whole picture, and ensure minimal adverse environmental impacts. Among other important habitats, it is essential that the Chilkat Bald Eagle Preserve remains pristine and unaffected, that impacts on commercial fishing in Dry Bay be considered, and that important salmon and trout habitats in the Alsek and Tatshenshini Rivers be protected.

Thank you for sharing your thoughts on this most serious matter; I will keep them in mind as this process moves forward.

While I have already raised my concerns about the proposed Geddes' Windy Craggy mine with you directly, and have alerted the Parliamentary Standing Committee on the Environment to the orebody's grave potential to generate massive acid mine drainage over long periods of time; and to the fact that I would prefer the orebody to be left undisturbed and the site declared a National Park; I want to make sure that you have in writing a clear statement from me calling for a complete Federal Environmental Assessment of this project.

The watershed draining the site becomes a transboundary river which could be irreparably harmed should acid mine drainage become a reality here. Moreover, the Tatshenshini drainage and surrounding highlands are home to many rare and special species of flora, fauna and perhaps fungi. As there are as yet no impacts from human activities, except those produced by ore disturbing mineral exploration, the region must be viewed as a major candidate for total protection as an ecologically sensitive wilderness area - before ore disturbing blasting and drilling and overburden removal begins in earnest.

Dear Jim:

Thank you for your letter regarding Geddes Resources' development of the large Windy Craggy Mine in Northwestern, B.C. I appreciate your update.

At this time I do not have any specific suggestions for you about downstream impacts in Alaska. I expect feedback from state officials and others in Alaska soon. I understand that Geddes scheduled a public meeting in Haines next Monday to answer questions about the project. I expect some of the issues with respect to Stage I of the environmental assessment will be identified during that meeting.

In addition, I was informed that several state agencies including the Division of Governmental Coordination, the Department of Transportation and Public Facilities, the Department of Environmental Conservation, and the Department of Commerce and Economic Development are providing comments on the Stage I document to Environment Canada. I am told that the state is satisfied, at this time, with its participation in the process and does not believe review by the International Joint Commission under the Canada-United States Boundary Waters Treaty is warranted.

I will let you know what I hear regarding Windy Craggy development from the Governor of Alaska and my constituents in Haines. My staff has begun to research the specifics of the project. If there are significant outstanding concerns about transboundary water quality questions, perhaps the International Joint Commission could be utilized.

Again, Jim, thank you for your update. I will be in contact with you soon should I have suggestions regarding development of the mine. Please feel free to contact me at any time about the project. I appreciate hearing from you.

Thank you for your letters of January 31, February 27 and April 6, regarding the Iskut mining road project and the Windy Craggy mine proposal. Please excuse the delay in my reply.

Both projects fall within the Northern Coast Mountains Region of the national parks system plan. The area is already represented by Kluane National Park Reserve and, therefore, the Canadian Parks Service has no plans to seek further representation within that region. In addition, because the project lies outside the Yukon Territory and the park reserve, land use decisions are the responsibility of the provincial government.

As you may know, the federal Environmental Assessment and Review Process (EARP) is, in its initial stages, a self-assessment exercise. Energy, Mines and Resources Canada, which is funding the Iskut road project, is responsible for ensuring that the EARP guidelines have been followed. Once an initial evaluation has been completed, the Honourable Jake Epp will determine whether a public review is required.


Geddes Resources Limited (GRL) is undertaking a comprehensive study of a proposed Windy Craggy access road corridor. Under the Canada/British Columbia Mineral Development Agreement (MDA), funding of up to \$50,000 was made available by the Department of Energy, Mines and Resources (EMR) and by the British Columbia Ministry of Energy, Mines and Petroleum Resources. That money will be used for specific studies on fisheries and wildlife, and for geotechnical assessments of the proposed route.

GRL has submitted the first stage of the Windy Craggy project environmental impact assessment (EIA) to the British Columbia Mine Development Review process. My department is conducting a detailed review of the minesite environmental assessment to ensure federal concerns, such as downstream salmon resources and transboundary water quality, are adequately addressed. Environment Canada is also co-ordinating a review of the project by the departments of Fisheries and Oceans and of Transport and by U.S. environmental agencies. Following the review of the first stage EIAs, federal agencies will determine how the Environmental Assessment and Review Process applies.

I trust that my comments are helpful.

I am certain that your officials have by now alerted you to the implications of the Geddes Resources' Windy Craggy mine proposal.

First off, that entire Alsek Tatshenshini River ecosystem should be part of the National Park System.

Even setting that aside, a basic analysis of the Stage 1 report reveals that the Acid Mine Drainage problems associated with the project are vast.

The Windy Craggy copper rock contains on average 35 % sulphur (most B.C. mines have 5 % and even they face serious environmental problems). The mine and waste rock sites will have massive sulphuric acid and toxic heavy metal production potential.

Large quantities of toxic, acid, bioaccumulative effluent (sulphuric acid, copper, cobalt, zinc, etc.) would drain from the tailings pond; estimated at 16,000 to 80,000 gallons per day. The plan to recapture this "leachate" after escape through the dams is not technically feasible.

Waste rock is to be deposited on the glacier and mixed with layers of limestone which is locally available. Over time these layers of limestone could lose their neutralizing capacity and cause bursts of acid mine drainage.

Serious independent impact studies have not been done on the potential volume or composition of liquid drainage from the site under all possible weather, surface runoff and groundwater flow conditions. I suggest you arrange for this.

A study of the percentage of liquid drainage which would "escape" and its impact on the Tatshenshini is needed.



C. Socio-economic

The project would create 500 jobs during 3 years of development and construction, and 600-650 jobs during operation. The annual payroll during operation is estimated at \$25 million, with annual operating supply costs estimated at \$45 million. Estimated tax generation to all levels of government over the first 10 years of operation is \$200 million. The capital investment required to develop the mine is estimated at \$500m.

D. Ownership

Geddes Resources Limited was incorporated in Ontario in 1981. As of the end of 1989, Northgate Exploration Limited owned 37%, Cominco Limited owned 17%. The company is listed on the T.S.E., and has offices in Toronto and Vancouver. Gerald Harper is the President and Chief Executive Officer.

2. Current Status

Geddes Resources has submitted its Stage 1 Socio-economic and Environmental Impact Assessment for Windy Craggy to the B.C. Mine Review Committee. The Committee has reviewed the document, and has asked Geddes to alter its mine development plans, and conduct a number of engineering studies to address both geological and environmental issues. These studies are underway, and will be submitted as an addendum to the Stage 1 Report this fall. The Departments of Energy, Mines and Resources, Environment and Fisheries and Oceans, as well as a number of U.S. Federal and State of Alaska authorities, have reviewed the Stage 1 Report and have provided comments to B.C. officials.

Because of the size and location of this mine, Geddes will be required to submit its plans to full EARP review. Hopefully, the review will be a joint Federal-provincial exercise. B.C. officials have already indicated their willingness to cooperate in a joint process.

Further to our recent conversations, our firm has been retained by Geddes Resources Limited to assist them with the government relations aspects of their proposed Windy Craggy copper mine development in north western B.C. The purpose of this note is to provide some background on the project, and to request an opportunity for a meeting between you, and Mr. Fraser, and Gerald Harper, President of Geddes, to brief you on the proposal.

1. Background

A. Location

The Windy Craggy development is situated in the Alsek Mountain Range approximately 190 kilometres south west of Whitehorse, in the northwestern pan-handle of B.C. Discovered in 1958 by Frobisher Exploration (now Falconbridge Ltd.), Geddes Resources acquired ownership of the property in 1983.

B. Geology

Windy Craggy is a world scale copper deposit, which, if developed, will increase annual copper production in B.C. and Canada by 120,000 tonnes per year, or about 1% of world production for at least 20 years. Exploration is continuing, and the potential for increasing reserves is considered excellent. An ultimate mine life of more than 40 years is considered likely.

Attached please find the comments of the Champagne-Aishihik Indian Band with respect to deficiencies in the Stage 1 application of Geddes Resources for the development of the Windy Craggy project. After our review of the application material in 5 Volumes we are recommending that a decision regarding approval-in-principle be deferred until further studies are carried out in Stage 2 of the B.C. Mine Development Review Process.

As you will note in our submission, the Southern Tutchone and Tlingit people of the Champagne-Aishihik Indian Band have a strong interest in the social, economic and cultural development of the renewable and non renewable resources of our traditional lands which extend south from the Yukon into British Columbia. We have recently registered a comprehensive claim with the Government of Canada for our aboriginal rights to the B.C. portion of our homeland.

Our interests cover not only the impacts of the proposed Windy Craggy mine development that would occur in the Yukon, but also include the development, operation and abandonment of the mine itself in B.C. We are concerned that if the mine receives approval, that it be developed according to sound social, economic and environmental principles. Accordingly we are pleased to submit our recommendations on deficiencies to be included in the terms of reference for Geddes Resources in Stage 2 of the review process.

We will be pleased to meet with you to discuss any of the issues raised in our submission. We look forward to continued involvement in the review of the Windy Craggy project.

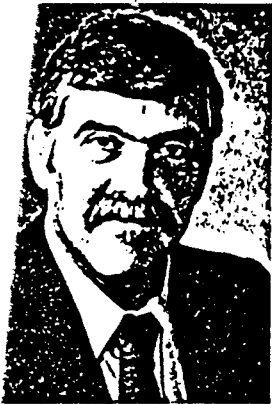

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
