Acknowledging receipt of your letter of June 27th, and this morning yours of July 9th, and wired you today as follows:

Here it the situation. This week two engineers from Bunkerhill were in this District, Mr. Alfred Nugent, Chief Geologist and Mr. Tibor Klobusicky Mining Consultant from Spokane and on Thurs. and Friday Mr. Klobssicky spent on the Scranton property going over He was well impressed with the S. W. end of it with Fred Hubic. the property but was disappointed that the cores of the holes on the Grandview were not split so that he could get a true picture of them. Friday they went over the 6040 area very carefully, and determined what Fred thot was a new lead 9 and 16ft in width was but a narrow fissure off of the main vein leading off to the west and Fred was measuring along side of the length he had uncovered. He personally told me that he was impressed with Fred and with the heavy overburden it was easily possible for him to be mistaken. He didn't examine the Pontiac end of the property, inasmuch as the old Pontiac drift was not opened and also that Fred did not know the location of the big blanket lead there. He was impressed with the production on both sides of the creek at the camp and said as soon as we had the Pontiac drift opened, he would run up from Spokane and examine In view of this we that there would be no point in asking you to come over, altho had you been more accessible, would have liked to have had you meet with Mr. Klobusicky and he expressed a wish that he could have met with you. So our vision of the location of a drift thru the mountain to reach the Sunset area, fades away at least for the present.

Starting Monday Fred and the men will start to reopen the Pontiac drift and it is going to be hard going on account of lack of timber close by. Also I will give Fred all the information relative to the location of the Blanket Vein and he will get it spotted. Fred will also try to get some work done on a new lead he found about 200 feet to the West of the 6040, where he said he found a 5 ft lead. This could give us access to the Sunset area if it develops into an ore bearing lead. And every lead in that country does so.

I am planning to have Fred look up the possibility of getting a Cat road up the old raw-hide trail from Pontiac to where it intersects our road about one mile below camp, and if this is possible it would help a lot on diamond drill holes below the Pontiac dump by stripping off the overdurden and also in rustling timber needed to re-open the Pontiac drift. How I wish it were possible for me to get over the ground, but this is out of the question.

You know Bill, a road into the Sunset Basin to the location of the No. 9 hole, to permit a cross-cut to reach that ore might be a feasible idea. It would be less than one mile in length and outside of at the upper end of Sunset Lake, not much rock work. What do you think?

Of course our big hand-i-cap is shortage of funds, but we have some prospects of selling the cabin.

The Bunkerhill people looked at the Victoria Mines property across Woodbury Creek, Lind's property, the Triumph Mines, The Western Mines and some in the Lardo and also in Revelstroke and are really looking for ore to keep their smelter supplied.

Will keep you posted and will need some hepp to get holes spotted on Pontiac. Mr. Klobusicky also that the area at camp between the two worked ore bodies should be drilled. In view of the big dyke on the camp side to the south of that ore body and to the fact that the fault at the north side of the ore body across the creek cut it off there, makes me wonder if it would pay to drill this area. It would be accessible at least. What do you think?

Excuse me Bill for such a long letter, but I need someone to talk things over with and wish you were as close as New Denver.

I have been promised a deal on Peters Creek in the Caribou and am looking for someone to join me in it.

10 Leases, 5 miles of creek. Formerly held by a Mr. Collins, deceased, who staked and tested the ground and decided he wanted it for himself. His test records are not available, but last Fall the next creek below this was stripped across the channel and from 3 feet to bedrock it went better than \$1.00 per pan.
