## REPORT ON THE COPPER PRINCE

### Introduction

The Copper Prince group was examined August 25th, 1948. The writer was accompanied by Mr. Len Empey and the property owners.

### Property & Ownership

Copper Prince consists of 2 claims, namely: Copper Prince No.1 and No.2 with Copper Prince No.1 on the west side of No.2. They are jointly owned by Nick Barlow and Ralph A. Gaustin of Westbridge, B.C.

### Location

Near the headwaters of Johnstone Creek on the east side and between the Chloride and Zamora Groups about 8 miles from Rock Creek, B.C. A fair road runs from the highway 3 miles west of Rock Creek to within  $\frac{1}{2}$  mile of the property.

### Timber, Water, Power etc.

There is plenty of timber for mining purposes. Water is available in Johnstone Creek and the West Kootenay power line is about 4 miles to the south.

### Geology

The principal rock is a chloritic schist, intruded by a coarse grained granitic rock with several smaller dykes. Most work has been done along the contact of the schists and intrusives.

### Development & mineralization

Near the center of the Copper Prince No.1, the western claim, a tunnel has been driven for 30 feet at 110 deg. showing a small quartz 6" vein starting at 10' from the portal and striking 130 degrees. The vein encounters a dyke 10' from the face and drags behind it. This quartz vein has copper stain with slight mineralization. Sample No.637 across 6 inches assayed Gold - tr. Sample No.638 on the dump assayed trace of gold.

25' to east and up hill is a small cut on the contact between the green schists and intrusives, with the intrusive on the north. This contact can be traced up the hill to the east for a distance of 1500' with occasional small cuts, showing a little copper stain in the contact with occasionally a small quartz veinlet.

On Crown Point No.2 over a small ridge, and on the east side, a tunnel has been driven 20' to the west with open cuts to the north and south. This work is in massive argillite and no commercial mineral is apparent. It would appear to be a spot picked as the easiest place to do assessment work.

### Conclusion

This property has no apparent value.
