SUMMARY

NAME: Deadwood.

LOCATION: West of Greenwood, B.C.

ACCESS: C.P. Railway crosses the property. Rails have been removed.

TOPOGRAPHY: Small relief. Tunnel from Greenwood, 5500' long, would obtain depth of 400' probably the greatest depth necessary.

GEOLOGY: Area of altered limestone on jasperoids, similar to Phoenix deposits.

ORE SHOWINGS: Meagre. Diamond drilling on the Greyhound claim is supposed to have proven sixty to seventy thousand tons of 1.25% copper ore.

PRICE & TERMS: Larger part of area under provisional option. Total amount asked \$50,000. Two other claims should not cost over \$15,000. Greyhound claim not included as price and terms not yet stated. Terms so far agreed upon call for first payment in eighteen months.

CONCLUSION: Drilling of the property strongly recommended.

Dear Sir:-

The following report has to do with Deadwood Camp, Greenwood, B.C. Report No. 80 by Mr. E.E. Campbell, our files, deals with the same area. His report was written in 1911. My report, No. 504, dated March 7th 1919, is a compilation of data, part of which is of questionable value, and much of uncertain value as full records are not obtainable.

At the time ~~the~~ first report was written I had not visited the camp. Since then several trips have been made to the camp and an attempt has been made to delimit the area within which "mineral zone" may be expected. Excepting on the southeastern and northern margins, there are no outcrops. On the Flute and Peacock claims there are many boulders of the "mineral zone" or epidote rocks and some ore. It is just possible that this represents float carried from other quarters, but the quantity is such that I have come to consider the limits, as shown on the map.

Regarding the southern portion still less is known as heavy drift covers the area not covered by lava. If these deductions are correct there is a large area underlain by the altered limestone, and there is perhaps the same probability of finding ore on the footwall as on the Monarch claim, Phoenix, where the conditions are very similar.

Reference to the section accompanying Report No. 80, shows the conditions as indicated by the shafts on the Greyhound and Ah There claims, both of which are now inaccessible, due to water. As noted in Report No. 504 the most encouraging results were obtained southwest of the Greyhound shaft. The deepest hole on that orebody showed ore to a depth

of about 250 feet so the mineral zone is evidently that deep if not as deep as indicated in the section in report No. 80.

PRICE & TERMS: Inquiries have been made of the owners of the claims included in the area, shown on the map as possibly orebearing. With two exceptions satisfactory answers have been returned. The Greyhound and Alameda are still uncertain factors and on the Burns Fraction no definite figures have been set, but no difficulty is anticipated.

More definite results have been obtained in the following cases:-

In every case where definite figures have been agreed upon the owners have signified a willingness to give us our own terms, within reason. There would therefore be no other expense than the cost of the exploratory work and taxes.

EXPLORATORY WORK: Diamond drilling can be relied upon to prove the presence of ore bodies in the area. If satisfactory arrangements cannot be made with the owner of the Greyhound then the first drilling should be done on the Ah There near the Greyhound line. Subsequent drilling to be done to the west on the Pluto and Peacock, and possibly the Montrose(Minto). Should the Greyhound claim be optioned then an attempt should be made to extend the orebody already indicated.

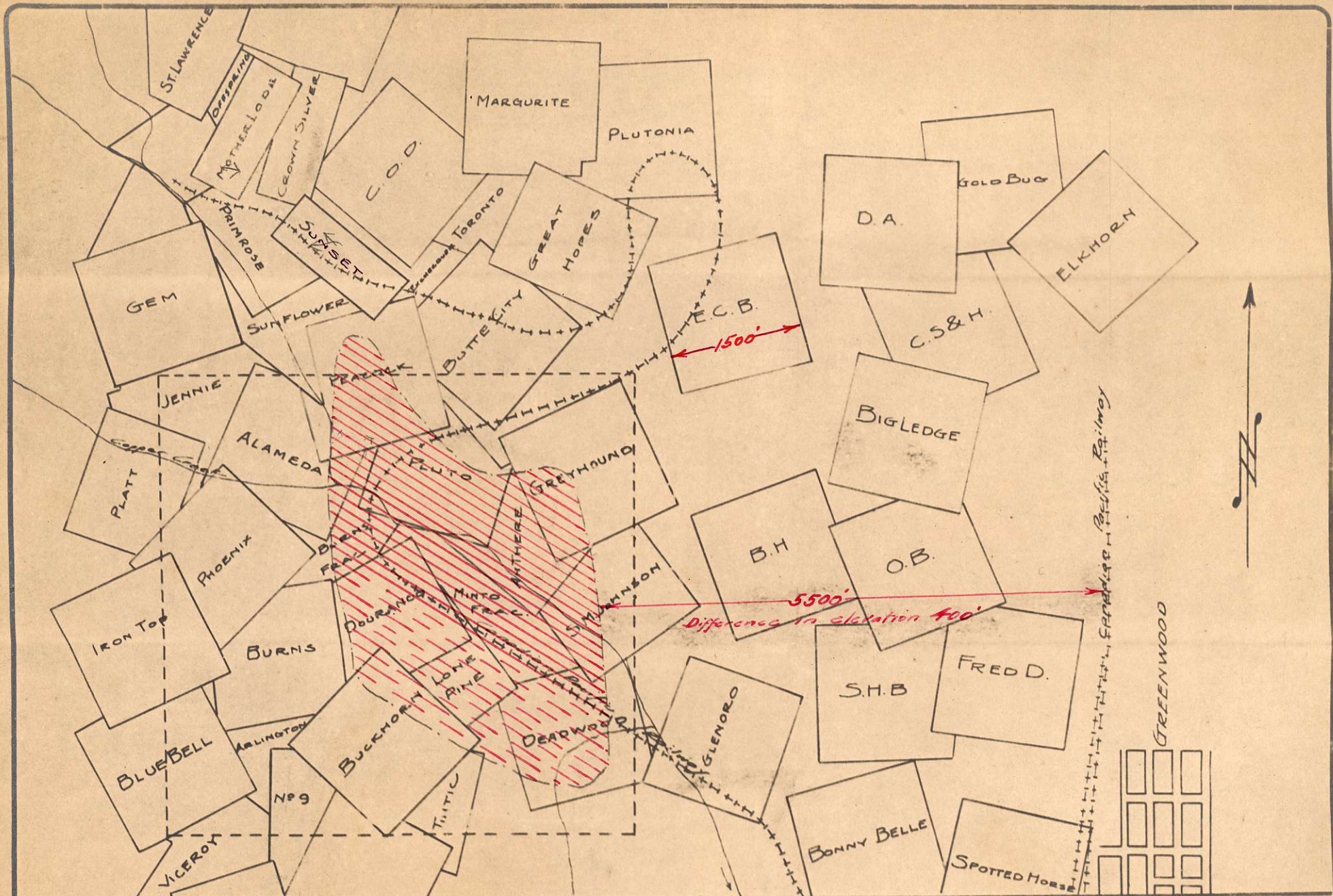
Five 300' holes would furnish information by which further prospecting should be governed. The cost of such drilling would be 1500 feet at \$2.50 (Copper not above 20¢, or \$3,750.00.

CONCLUSIONS: The work so far done on the claims shows a mineralized zone of fair size and probably of large extent. As yet a small portion only has been tested and that part has not been discredited. I strongly recommend that drilling be done somewhat as shown.
