Attached is a sketch of the claim groups in the Anuk River area showing the Pan and adjoining claims.

You will note that Hudson Bay are holding their ground, That the Bell are doing the same, and that Conwest have lapsed most of their ground except those claims immediately adjacent to the H.B. ground.

Our plan to work in the Iskut area hinged on getting an American heliocopter, and the chances of that are now very s slim. Recently. Asbestos applied to use their canadian machine in Alaska and were refused permission. It is therefore, very doubtful if the Cdn companies will allow an American machine in B.C.

I spoke to John Deleen, American Metals, regarding activity in the Stikine area. He told me that he had been on all the claim groups in the Porcupine, Scud area and the Anuk and had not seen anything very interesting. He said he had examined the S.S. Copper group owned by Highland Bell and had turned it down. He also has discarded his own ground east of the H.B. claims on Canyon Ck. I understand Charlie Brown did some stripping on the Bell ground- this latter from the staff in Vancouver. Have not seen the bald-headed little man this sesson.

You might be able to check some of this information with DeLeen's boss in Toronto or even with Phil Jenny, who visited the showings held by the Bell and American etals, last year.

It still stands that if I get in that country with a heliocopter, I'll try and get on the Pan group (or at least hover over the ice field...)

a block of sixteenadjoining H.B. ground. The latter company are maintaining their ground. Ameo field Ehgr. John Deleen tells me he has been on the Anuk and has not seen anything of interest on the Triana ground. Incidently, he has drilled his own showing and did not find anything of value. Highland Bell have maintained their ground south of Scott Simpson Mtm. The four claims on the anuk owned by Malicky and leason lapsed or lapse early September. There is no re cord of claims staked in the Iskut or its tributaries, except a group in the vicinity of the Bronson Mine Grants. I surveyed the claim staking situation in all the Northern half of B.C. and with the exception of the Conwest Asbestos ground, only small groups of 8 to 16 claims have been recorded. In B.C. generally, there is little prospecting activity. Norand a have closed their Yreka operation and the work around Greenwood. Highland Valley is the most active camp in Southern B.C. There is some work going on in the Kamloops copper belt. The Kootenays are shaking in the boots over the proposed American tarrif proposals against Lead and Zinc. Conwest's Tootsie Lake base metal show is a zinc property, underground on t e first level opened up. They are just starting a second level, but Connell says they will not be able to do sufficent work to get the required information to assess before the next option payment is due, which, I gather is a sizable one. I flew to Vancouver with him. Calev No 2 has been turned over to Cassiar for development. He has plans to boost the tonnage at Keno Hill. I note your letter and Ted Jackas regarding the Gal group and have advised the stakers of the intention.

I have completed an agreement with Mr. W. McKinnon of Whitehorse under the terms of which he undertakes to stake, record and transfer to myself, in trust for the Exploration Company now being formed, 32 mining claims tying on or as close as physically possible to the discovery made by prospectors of the Hudson Bay Mining & Smelting Company Limited in the general Iskut River Area of British Columbia.

McKinnon is to receive the sum of \$100 per claim staked, recorded and transferred, plus actual expenses incurred in staking, which I consider is a reasonable figure taking into consideration the location and the exceedingly rugged and diffi-The staking, barring unforeseen difficulties, cult terrain involved. should be completed within the next three or four weeks.


A copy of the agreement between McKinnon and myself has been forwarded to Mr. Andrew for his records. I shall keep you posted regarding progress being made in this undertaking.
