In a further telephone conversation with Mr. Wohlberg, he agreed that a deal involving $\$ 1000.00$ down payment; $\$ 20,000$ at the end of two or three years, and a $5-10 \%$ interest in a new company to be formed over the property is satisfactory.

May I add that Mr. Bud Rogan, Funeral Director here in Fin Flong, was the man who brought the samples to me and put me in contact with Mr. Wohlberg. Mr. Rogan spent a vacation in southern Saskatchewan this summer, and picked up samples from Mr. Wohlberg, promising him that he would contact a mining company and have the samples assayed. Mr. Rogan expects a nominal remuneration if a mining company develops out of the property.

Mr. Wohlberg's samples are supposed to be representing the poorer grade sections in the veins. He advised me that he has had assays done earlier this year which gave him much better results in both gold and silver values.

Mr. S. R. Wohlberg, Box 22, Disley, Saskatchewan, or phone The Iunsden Exchange 27R3, has a group of four claims Eli Nos. 1, 2, 3, and $V$ \& $M$, in the Slocan Mining Division, British Columbia.

This property lies six miles from Slocan City. One and a half miles from a gravelled highway a logging trail runs in the valley to just below his claims, which are about 2,000 feet up from the valley floor. The property lies on Memphis Creek in the Kaslo Mining Area locally known as Half Mile Creek.

There are 3 small veins discovered by Mr。Wohlberg. One has been opened for 30 feet in length on the Eli 2 claim. It pinches and swells from 4 to 12 inches. An assay (\#063) of much broken material in this vein ran 1.84 oz . Au, and $70.28 \mathrm{oz} . \mathrm{Ag}$.

Another vein on the $V$ \& $M$ claim is 3 to 18 inches in width as it pinches and swells along the strike and is exposed for 40 feet into the hill. A grab sample taken by Mr. Wohlberg (\#062) was similar in appearance to the forme sample 061 in that it was sugar quartz with rusty threads. This sample did not contain as much broken material and actually had two large pieces of approximately 4 to 5 inches in diameter. It gave four different assay results (\#62)

I asked Mr. Wohlberg what he wanted in payment for this property and it was apparent to me that he had very little experience in dealing mining property. He first thought that $\$ 2,500$. down payment would be appropriate, but after a minutes conversation he was agreeable to a much smaller payment of $\$ 1,000$ to $\$ 2,000$ for a total of $\$ 25,000$. Apparently he would be amenable to other suggestions. He advised me that he has had no other engineer on his property to examine his showings, but that there was an engineer, Mr. Phillips, from Toronto in the general area a few miles away this summer, who had five men working on a property.

There is another sample assayed from Mr. Wohlberg, which covers a group of eight mag claims from the same area. This sample $\# 061$, which contained considerable magnitite runs 1.47 copper and .08 oz . Au. Mr. Wohlberg says this is from a vein 4 feet wide and runs for approximately 500 feet.

A third vein with no sample described by Mr. Wohlberg has been exposed for 100 feet averaging 6 to 8 inches in width. He says that these veins apparently are exceptionally rich where they narrow, but will give good assay results on their wider points.
