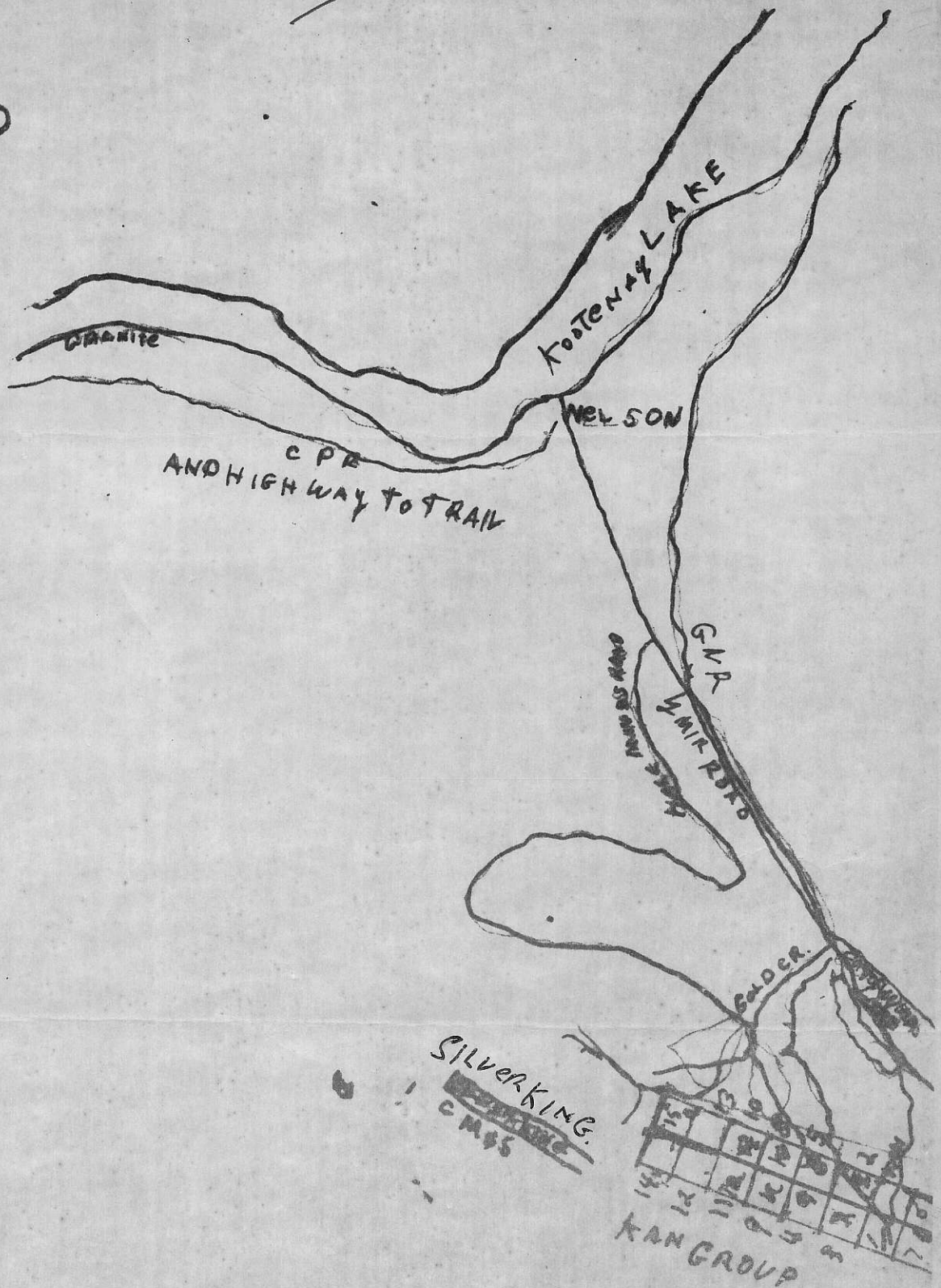

This refers to your letter September 6th and the accompanying report by Blaney on the Kan Group and mineral claims which he has staked on the Walmer Road S.E. of Nelson, B.C. in the Kootenay Mining Division.

Based on this report, an examination I might say, that the Kan group of mineral claims warrant an examination. Further, that the examination can be made this Fall, at least of the underground workings and that possibly some of the surface workings. I have worked in that area in October and November and unless it is an unusually heavy and early snow fall this year, the surface showings should be able to be examined.

Enclosed with the memo and Blaney's letter the sketch of the Barnet group of mineral claims which apparently are not referred to in his September 27th letter. I believe from examination of the map that the Barnet group, which are shown to be on Lemon Creek are in the Slocan Mining Division and are near the property that Stan Leeming examined for Prospectors Airways about two years ago which property was reported to be a lead-silver showing on which Stan thought some magnetometer work should be done, followed up possibly by a few drill holes. You may recall his summary, which I believe you have on file in the Toronto office, of the claims that were examined by Leeming and incidently by myself, I believe this year, are located approximately a mile west of Blaney's description of his Barnet group and I believe that this Barnet group is a re-staking of an old mineral showing in the area.

I have not had any correspondence from Blaney this summer, and am curious to know what happened to the original proposal that he had to stake a lead vein in the Kootenay area which was the original and number one project of forming his syndicate. Do you have any information from him on this; and if not would it be in order to write Blaney direct to find out what he was able to secure and what work he did on that original project.
