Enclosed clipping will bear out what Smitheringale said about Consolidated wanting a lot of manganese. We have just as high grade with the Rhon donite with it and gold in next claims. Clipping is out of local paper. Say maybe Macrae could look at that manganese we use to have at I2I2 Alaska Highway. Seemed to be a good showing but needed a bull dozer to show up any more veins. It was open and might be worth restaking as there will be a steel mill out of Fort St. John when they get that new power plant in and they have started the big dam at Hudson's Hope. There is a immense body of bog iron all along the Peace River which is what Swed ## has figured on. So you would know whether they need manganese or not. Tell Macrae to talk to John McKenzie on the side for information on this manganese. He works in Emery's office but Emery is a Karl Springer man, but McKenzie will give Macrae the necessary information and they might have some samples in the museum or mining office. These claims were all turned over to H.B. when they took over Quill Creek but they let them go. I think we had 24 claims staked there. Too bad Macrae was not able to spend a few days with us before and maybe you would be making this deal with Consolidated.

We are incorporating "Grandoro" Exploration Co. Ltd. " 400,000 shares; 5000 shares to a unit. So you better take 2 units at fifty a unit and I can keep you posted on this area. Will try and have Macrae look over our Beavertell claims, across from Highland Bell. Wish I had a few minutes talk with you so I could explain it better. Re your letter of the 22<sup>nd</sup> on Rhodonite. This has to be brought from Sweden now for building trimmings. The new local Bank of Commerce here is trimmed with what they call Rosy Quartz and was bought in Sweden, at \$1800 freight and charges alone.

But the main bet on these claims is the manganese, 30% and Consolidated will need lots of it for their new steel mill at Kimberley, now being built. Was informed by a prospector just in from Vancouver that Mr. Smithingale told him to look for manganese as they would be needing a steady supply for the steel operations. Might be worth Macrae's time to look it over.

Dear Ted,

With Albert Coy on August 2nd I examined the Atlas Group of 14 mineral claims owned by Coy and Albert Phelps, located 15 miles east of Oliver, B.C. and due north of the old Camp McKinney in the Grand Forks Mining Division.

Coy and Phelps own three other groups of mineral claims, which I did not have time to examine. All are staked on old known showings, such as the Grandoro.

The Atlas Group covers <sup>a</sup> Hornblendite Dyke which they have traced for 3,000 feet. A nickel mineral, unidentified, occurs erratically at four locations in this Dyke. The Dyke outcrops along a north/south strike in a schistose sediment. It appears to be about 7-10 feet wide. Nickel minerals are not prevalent through the whole length of the dyke because in two locations we could not get any reaction with the dimethyl powder. I do not think there is any concentration of nickel mineral. I am of the opinion the mineral is Millerite or one of the nickel silicates. Have sent a sample to Thompson at U.B.C. for formal identification and I have two samples, chipped samples, at J. R. Williams for assay.

Coy could not be pinned down to the terms under which the Atlas Group could be optioned. He has large ideas of forming a syndicate, based on the Atlas, Grandoro, a 2-claim gold prospect north of Rock Creek and a 4-claim group east of Highland Bell across Kettle River. Of the claim group I did not examine the lead silver in the vicinity of Highland Bell - may be worth examining once he has done some stripping and exposing of the mineral which appears to occur as a replacement in a quartzite.



Dear Mr. Christolm -

Thanks for your letter of the 21<sup>st</sup>. Mr. Rod Macrae phoned today that after a trip to Highland Valley he would be here Thursday or Friday. Sure feel that I will be able to show him something that will interest him, although I believe the nickel will be too low grade as we can get a color with the acid on one sample and not on all. Also will show him the Beaver dell claims. He knows the history of the old Grand and Twin Lakes area. The sample from dividend might be of interest also.

I have a syndicate formed on the same basis as in Whitehorse that was incorporated as Yukon Mining which after Quill Creek sure turned out well for the unit holders. Sixty units, selling forty units at \$50.00 a unit, 35 units placed - with local business men. Bryan Newberk was in one of the Whitehorse syndicates under Clarendon Woods Ltd.
