Dear Sir: Would you be interested in examining three groups of claims in the Vernon Mining Division? 1st Group. Silverado - 8 claims $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles up Newport creek from highway, west side of Okanagan lake. Road runs through claims and is about 1500 feet from where work was done on claims.

Considerable open pit work on vein which is between 3 and 4 feet in width, it carries gold, silver, copper, lead, and zinc. The strike is down the hill towards the creek, by stripping the vein along the strike considerable depth could be obtained for drifting on it. Easy to strip with bulldozers or by hand. Other parallel veins near but no work done on them. Ore has been shipped from claims above this group.

The only assay I have taken was a grab sample from ore on the dump which assayed: Gold. 0.15 oz. to the ton, silver 4.4 oz. to the ton, lead. 3.8% per ton, zinc trace, copper trace.

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2nd Group - Lucky group: 4 claims on abandoned logging road, road leads right to veins on claims. 2 veins, the only assay I have taken was from some ore on dump, grab sample, it assayed as follows:
Gold, 0.0307 oz. per ton, silver, 27.1 oz. per ton, lead, 20.32%
zinc 0.5% per ton, copper trace.

Group 2 is in the Cherryville district about 4 miles on logging road from Monashee highway. This is an abandoned road but in good repair. The ore occurs in a limy shale. There is a small ultra-basic dyke in the cut.

3rd Group - Silver Horde Group: 8 claims in Cherryville District, $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles by trail from logging road. Road could be made to claims at small cost. Many veins on claims, veins are massive and best ore occurs at a fault across veins. Ore was shipped from claims in 1914 by owners, at that time it had to be packed 12 miles by pack horse and then hauled by wagon about 50 miles to Vernon. I do not know what values they received. Two sample taken in 1950 by a man who had an option on the property but who had no interest in it other than to attempt to sell it to

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others gave the following assays: Sample No. 1. Gold, $5\frac{1}{2}$ oz. to the ton, silver 505 oz. to the ton. Sample No. 2. Gold, 192 oz per ton, silver 1362 $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. per ton. I might add that this man has been trying to get me to let him attempt to sell these claims ever since. I received a telegram from him last October in which he stated that he had a group who would like to examine it. I do not have to deal with chisekers and will sell it myself.

I got an assay from a grab sample from what I call the McQueen dump last year. This claim is about $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles by trail from where the above assays were taken. It assayed: Gold, 0.70 oz. per ton silver, 477.7 oz. per ton, lead 32.4% per ton, copper 0.54% per ton. There is of course a hell of a lot of quartz that carry very little values. As you can realize the above assays were picked samples and in no way representative of the property as a whole. I am sending you some of the best ore I could find on the dump and I want you to have it assayed for Gold, silver, lead, copper and zinc.

I intend to stake two more claims adjoining this group in the spring. I am also sending you a grab sample from some ore on the dump at the Silverado group. Will you please return the sample sacks along with the assays as I have no more sample sacks. These claims cannot be examined until the snow goes off. I may have other claims to show you by then. If there is any questions you would like answered in relation to these groups I will do my best to answer them.
