This prospect was originally found in 1954 by Sig Muldohl for Canadian Explorers, however only very low assays were obtained Work in 1955 showed some native copper in altered serpentine 10miles west of Tedideech Lakein the Nahlin River. A nickle zone (Millerite) was also discovered near "Opal Lake" 5 miles west of Tedideech Lake in an altered serpentine, but the weathed outcrops gave low assays only.

In 1956 trenching and packsack drilling showed up a zone 6' wide and possible 200-300' long of high grade nickle (Millerite) mineralization, surrounded by a zone 20' wide of scattered minerate -ization. Some assays are said to have given up to 12% Ni.but no complete evaluation of this zone is known. The nicket mineralization lies in a zone 100'/1100' long of pyritezation.

## General Geology.

The belt of altered serpentine is said to be about 25 miles long

there is only one known nicket showing as yet. Limestone which dips 70° south striking nth 70 forms the northern limitof the zone. This is cut on the south by a fuult, beyond which is a zone of several hundred feet wide of sheared end-opalized and carbonized serpentine, which seems to have been derived from Peridot, To the south is Greenstone.

The nickel mineralization is mainly tiny veinlets of Millerite 1/16" wode and 1" long, through this carbonatized and opalized Serpen

-tine, and is only known in the one locality.


The copper showing is about 6miles on the same structure, and this fact, with the few outcrops of oarbonated serpentine along the entire structure has resulted in a narrow strip of ground among the formation being staked.

By now, it is safe to assume that the entire formation has been

hasked ,at least two claims wide.

The only ground which is not as yet held by companies and possibly open for dealing, is that staked by Peterson of Atlin, the 24 claims staked by Alf Allen, and some ground held under Mulduhl's name.
