Fort Reliance Minerals Ltd's Windpass Lease, Kamloops District, B.C.

Attached are a general report on the property and a report on a ground magnetometer survey, both written by A. D. Wilmot, a B. C. professional engineer who represents Fort Reliance in western Canada. The first report also includes reprints of some old Government information.

Jim Harquail of Fort Reliance first submitted this property to Kerr in June of last year, and we declined any serious interest in it. He re-submitted several days ago mainly because of the ground magnetometer survey which Wilmot did over the property last fall. In my opinion the survey indicated little more than the already known small magnetite-rich zones on the property and therefore does not enhance it.

The property which is 60 miles north of Kamloops, <sup>and</sup> at 5500' elevation, ~~was~~ was originally staked in 1916 as a gold prospect, and between 1933 and 1939 there was a recorded production of 34,246 ozs. of gold and 1,568 ozs. of silver from 84,000 tons mined, ie. an average grade of 0.41 oz. Au and .02 oz. Ag. The gold is in both quartz veins and in magnetite-rich small pod-like replacement bodies in quartz diorite. Even in Harquail's estimation the property is not an attractive gold bet; he seems to consider it an iron bet but the magnetic anomalies are too small to be reflecting any sufficient iron deposits.

Fort Reliance's interest in the property was started by Mr. Lindsley asking them to rediscover an old gold-in-magnetite property he remembered. After much research they finally located it and have felt, in my opinion, obliged to satisfy Mr. Lindlsey's curiosity by retaining it and doing a survey on it.

I recommend that we do nothing more about it.
