TWO BROTHERS VALLEY GOLD MINES LIMITED

2 October 1959

Presented in April 1937 by Mr. G. Brereton:

Property consists of potential placer areas in the Two Brothers Valley, Northern B.C., located near Two Brothers Lake, north of Finlay River, Omineca M.D.

There is no road into the area. Access is by plane from Takla Lake - 165 miles.

The company has been testing large gravel deposits on Two Brothers and McLaren Creeks for the past three years. The Operation was conducted haphazardly and all work was suspended in the spring of 1936. - Company financial difficulties. The operation was in charge of placer engineer Mr. Sen Hancock and while available data states good values were obtained, there is nothing on which to form a definite opinion regarding the deposit. No record is available of the details of the testing operations. Property dormant at present time. Yuba Dredging sent a Mr. Bigelow into the area to examine from a dredging point of view. He was favourably impressed and suggested in letters to Yuba President that it was a good property - they did not proceed with development of same. Property was financed by Mr. C.M. Bell of Calgary - owner of the Calgary-Albertan - he died in 1936. Directors are now seeking capital.

During 1935 some sluicing was done under direction of Hancock, for testing purposes. Some nice specimens of gold were recovered. Records and data on this property is very incomplete. No definite conclusion can be drawn from same with reference as to whether the property offers large yardage placer possibility. Enough data is available to suggest it is worth some further testing.

CH Stewart advised that this property was recently being revised by Vancouver Districts. He recently investigated the data again & got in touch with Hancock now living in Los Angeles. Hancock himself thought Two Brothers creek would average 25¢/yard & McLaren possibly 50¢/yard. Stewart thought the grade too low for the risk involved. Hancock is not thought to be very reliable. The deposit was in fact recent gravels not Tertiary - and there is some suggestion of salting according to Stewart's investigation. It would cost over 100,000 to do a proper test job and is probably not worth the risk according to Stewart.
