Herewith complete sample notes of Exploration
204, Omineca Mining Division, Northern B.C.

Sketches in red of claims staked by the writer
are also enclosed.

The following summary of Field Notes, with
remarks, is submitted:

MANSON CREEK DISTRICT

✓ 1. Boulder Creek.

Eight claims staked. Profusion
of large quartz veins, 3 to 18 ft. wide. Galena-
mineralization good in narrow streaks, but very scant
on the whole. Probably valueless without railroad.

✓ 2. Lost Creek

Fourteen claims staked. Numerous
quartz veins 2 to 8 feet wide. Galena - fair min. in
6" streaks, rest poor. Probably not commercial with
present transportation.

✓ 3. Lost Creek Pack Trail

Two claims staked. Fair
galena showings in quartz from old caved trenches.
Width unknown; probably small.

✓ 4. Manson Creek, (Willow and Alder Claims)

7-foot
quartz vein, with wide bands pyritic schist. Gold-
silver prospect. Of value only in case commercial
amounts these metals.

✓ 5. Slate Creek

Two claims staked. Mineralization
grey copper and copper carbonates. Vein narrow. Gold-
silver prospect only. Copper valueless.

✓ 6. Blackjack Mountain

Twelve claims staked. Several
quartz veins 2 to 3 feet wide. Gold-silver prospect.
Heavy mineralization pyrite, pyrrhotite, chalcopyrite,
and little galena. Valueless unless channels show
commercial grade gold-silver.

AREAS VISITED, BUT NO CLAIMS STAKED

1. Tom Creek Quartz stringers in graphitic schists.
Unpromising.
2. AKUS LAKE CREEK Wide mineralized zone in creek bed.
Possible values gold-silver. District remote, and values probably low.
3. Bear Lake High rock bluffs, showing conglomerates and grits intruded by granite sheets. Mineralization lacking. Negative in pan.
4. Skutsil Knob (Driftwood Mountain) Lavas and sediments interbedded. Reputed copper district. Showings seen worthless.
5. Tacla Lake; Boline (deceased) claim Narrow veins.
Complex mineralization copper, lead, and zinc. Of value only in case high-grade gold-silver.

In general, none of the places seen on this exploration appears of much present worth. Upon receipt of the assay results by numbers I can recommend definitely what action.
