

CORANEX PROJECT -- MONTHLY REPORT

August and September, 1967

Peach Lake Project

The geochemical and magnetometer surveys of the more favourable areas in our Peach Lake claim group were completed. The best areas indicated by the geochemical survey and the geological mapping were covered by an I.P. survey which revealed about fifteen targets for investigation by various methods. A report, completed in mid-September, contained maps documenting all the work done in 1967 by the Coranex staff and also recommendations for some bulldozer stripping and about 5000 feet of diamond drilling. The final copy of the geophysical report is still forthcoming. At a meeting in Toronto on September 25th, the proposed follow-up program of bulldozer stripping and diamond drilling was approved.

All of our student assistants left about the beginning of September to return to school leaving Nick Wychopen as the only temporary employee. An extra man was hired to help Nick in slashing the brush along the access roads in fulfillment of Forestry Service requirements.

Reconnaissance Work

A minor amount of prospecting and sampling was done in the Cariboo area (Quesnel Project). However nothing of importance has turned up thus far. We hope to continue some of this work in October.

Colin Campbell and Nick Wychopen spent a few days on our claim group near Egmont Point, fifty miles northwest of Vancouver. They found the reported copper showings along the creek and took samples which were estimated to be very low in copper content. They also found that our claims conflicted with four prior claims that were improperly plotted on the government claim map. A short report on this work was written by Colin Campbell and will be edited and submitted in the coming winter season; however our claims will be allowed to lapse.

Colin Campbell spent several weeks in August compiling and organizing the data from his Yukon and British Columbia work and this data will be reviewed by the writer in the coming winter. Colin Campbell left our employ at the end of August.
