

**THE QUENVILLE SYNDICATE**  
**Claim Holdings - Fox Discovery Area**  
Nicola Project, Nicola Mining Division, British Columbia

The Quenville Syndicate was formed to capture an early opportunity to acquire mineral tenure as near as possible to a new copper/zinc volcanogenic massive sulphide (VMS) occurrence discovered (Fox discovery) by employees of Gitennes Exploration Ltd. (T-GIT) of Vancouver. The occurrence is an undrilled surface showing 2 - 4 meters wide exposed in trenches 75 - 100 meters long in a NS strike length immediately beneath the Coquihalla Highway, 27 km north of Merritt, British Columbia (NTS - 92I/7). Assays range 10 - 33% zinc, 1-3% copper and credits of gold, silver and lead. Boulders indicate more widespread mineralization. Evidence to date indicates that the occurrence is in the western facies of the Triassic Nicola volcanics. If this holds true, the concept of VMS in Nicola opens up brand new, extensive and exciting exploration opportunities.

Gitennes has located a large claim block consisting of approximately 400 claim units (10,000 hectares), roughly sixteen km along strike in a north/south direction, and six km in an east/west direction. The claims cover a large length of the Clapperton fault, with the Nicola volcanics to the west, and the Triassic to Tertiary intrusive complexes to the east. Favourable geology therefore is in a north/south direction, along strike, or to the west.

The Quenville Syndicate consists of three participants, John R. Kerr, P. Eng., Warner Gruenwald, P. Geol., and Rob Montgomery, B.A.Sc., each holding a one third interest in the properties. The ability to react on the announcement precipitated the syndicate to acquire three strategically located claim blocks, as shown on the attached map. All properties are located by two-post claims, and the representation on the map has been determined by the information supplied by provincial records. Two of the properties abut the Gitennes ground, one possibly being surrounded. The third property is located to the west covering a reported copper/zinc showing. Details of each property are as follows.

1) **Dart Claims:** Twenty claim units (500 hectares) tied on to the south end of the Gitennes ground and along strike, nine km south of the discovery area. This is the claim block that may be surrounded by Gitennes ground, the ownership of adjoining ground has yet to be determined. Several documented minifile occurrences and assessment reports are located perhaps on or in the general area of the claims. These details have yet to be researched. To the west and tied on to the Dart claims is the historic Swakum Mountain lead/zinc/copper/silver/gold camp. This camp has recorded small, but high grade vein production. The favourable volcanic rocks have been identified on the ground, and Nicola volcanics are interpreted to underlie the entire claim area. The Clapperton fault approximates the eastern boundary of the claims.

2) **The Quen/Ville Claims:** Sixteen claim units (400 hectares) are tied on to the northwestern side of the Gitennes ground, four and a half km northwest of the discovery area. There are no known mineral occurrences on the property, however favourable volcanic rocks have been located and are interpreted to underlie the entire claim area. The positioning of the claims was to cover the northwestern trending lineament (fault?) of Quenville creek, that hosts a copper occurrence at a small lake, 3 km to the northwest. The claim area has been surrounded by later claims.

3) **The Bruin Claims:** Six claim units (150 hectares) cover a copper/zinc occurrence in Nicola volcanics located on Rey creek, four km to the west of the Gitennes ground and seven and a half km to the west of the discovery area. The area encroaches into Guichon creek area, and the general area of the favourable Guichon batholith, hosting the world class porphyry (and skarn) copper deposits of the Highland valley.

The participants of the **Quenville Syndicate** have a long history of working in the subject area, dating to the mid nineteen sixties. As a matter of fact several discovery areas of mineralization near the Fox discovery area were made by one of the participants (John R. Kerr) in the late sixties. The same participant lived in Kamloops through the Highland valley discoveries in the late sixties and the Afton discoveries to the north, in the early seventies. Warner Gruenwald commenced working with Kerr in the early seventies, working the entire area of the Nicola volcanics of NTS map sheet 92I, which includes the Highland valley and Afton areas. A voluminous file of private, unpublished data and documented showings for this area exist and are easily accessed.

The **Quenville Syndicate** is entertaining sales of these properties either separately or as a package. Package deals will consider a modest discount. One of the following three methods of sale is proposed:

- 1) Two cash payments, the first up front on expressing an intent to purchase, and the second on signing formal agreement. One block of shares of the purchasing company up to the maximum allowed by regulatory bodies on approval of agreement.
- 2) A more regular option to purchase agreement shall be entertained if the purchaser will commit to a minimum first year work commitment of \$20,000 per property, providing this work to be managed by the syndicate.
- 3) A package deal of all properties including rights to the syndicate's file of 92I and coveting that all properties are acquired in this area fall into a common package. The purchaser of this package must commit to a minimum first year expenditure of \$100,000, managed by the syndicate.
