Hi Tom,

I've had a look for the property in question. What I have been able to find is a location from the Notice of Work on a mineral claim. The co-ordinates are UTM ZN 10, 5604562N, 331424E. This point will be within the area of work planned for the site. For greater detail specifically on the mineral exploration project please contact Ian Webster (Mines Inspector) or Lehigh Cement directly. I've just burrowed into his database ... An important note here is that Lehigh has applied for a Mines Act Permit to do exploration work. I see no related information that suggests they are applying for a mining permit (a whole different and Bigger thing). A Notice of Work is required to do any exploration work on a mineral claim and so is a normal occurrence. Read the Mines Act and Regulations, available through the gov't home page, for all the ins and outs.

On our MapPlace website ([www.mapplace.ca](http://www.mapplace.ca)) the NOW is within mineral tenure number 522554 owned by Lehigh Cement Corp. By viewing the MTO tenure layers you will be able to see where the mineral claims in the area lie. If you want to get co-ordinate values you will need to go through our MapPlace map, download the Mineral Titles Online report and link into the claims information from there. An image (relative vector) can be captured using the COPY function in the MapPlace map window and pasting it into a graphics package. Give me a call if you need a walk through. Also note that the MapPlace information is public domain and is available to all persons. So your recreation applicant may be assisted by looking at our website. We also have a lot of non-mining info in our maps that is very useful, including park, first nation and fisheries material.
