EXPLORATION:

Slesse Cr.
- IG Machine and Fibre Ltd. has applied for a licence to quarry 24,000 tonnes of limestone from a past-producing MOTH quarry at the mouth of Slesse Creek in the Chilliwack valley. If successful, it hopes to expand production. The company is currently running a drill program to confirm and expand on its known reserve.

- IMA Resource Corp. has arranged a private placement worth \$345,000. Presumeable at least some of it will be spent on the company's two interesting skarn properties (Bacon and Cobalt Star) near Campbell River.

Storey Cr.
- Doublestar Resources Ltd. has staked the Storey Creek skarn property near Nimpkish Lake. The property has a small reported drill indicated resource of 83,000 tons of 12.5% Zn, 3.7% Pb, 1.69% Cu and 64.4 g/t Ag. However, the surrounding area host numerous untested showings and there is considerable potential to add to it.

- Consolidated Van Anda Gold Ltd. sold capital equipment for \$200,000 to finance completion of its magnetite processing circuit on Texada Island. It expects to start producing magnetite for the coal industry "in a few weeks".

- Consolidated Logan Mines Ltd. has arranged a private placement worth \$112,000. Some of it may be destined for the Lucky/Toq property, near Kennedy Lake. Similarly, Canquest Resource Corporation has arranged a private placement worth \$97,500, some of which may go to the O.K. porphyry property, near Powell River.

- Lafarge Canada Inc. has nearly completed the upgrade on its new cement plant in Richmond. It is now hiring staff. The new plant will take feed from Texada (limestone) and Sumas (silica and clay) and it will burn coal from Quinsam.

Subject: SOUTHWESTERN REGION MONTHLY REPORT: SEPTEMBER II

EXPLORATION:

Mt. Price Falls - Westmin Resources obtained BCParks/Mines permits to drill two deep surface holes from Mount Price in Mid-September, too late in the year to start drilling. It will run the \$1.5 million program next year. In the meantime, it will have to take a risk in setting the direction of a 600 metres of cross-cut drift required to access and drill the Marshall Zone.

On a more cheerful note, the company should have a similar cross-cut drift in the Price Mine area finished and available to drill the Trumpeter Zone later this year.

- Imperial Metals has completed eight holes on the Giant Copper property in the newly enlarged Skagit "dough-nut hole". The holes encountered thick sections of altered and mineralized intrusive rock in the vicinity of the old Invermay adits - an area last mined in the 1930's. The core suggests a structurally controlled "porphyry Cu" system with abundant tourmaline. The company will complete two more holes this fall (Visited).

- Verdestone Resources is currently drilling the first of two deep holes in exceedingly rugged terrain on Float Creek to test part of a 5.0 Km diameter circular molybdenum system. The company has been plagued with bad weather and poor drillers but it does seem to be getting better grades at depth, as predicted (Visited).

Lucky - Consolidated Logan Mines Limited has completed an airborne magnetic survey on the Lucky property, near Ucluelet. It is currently exploring a (fault-bound?) siliceous breccia on Mount Redford that contains gold and arsenic. This is a new type of mineralization in an area better known for its skarn showings.

- Several NOW for small to moderate sized late season programmes including a surprising number for Mid and Lower Coast projects.
