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GREEN VALLEY MINE INCORPORATED (GVY-V)

ADDITIONAL DRILLING PLANNED TO TEST - Charles Boltard, GEOLOGICAL MODEL NEAR KAMLOOPS president of Green Valley Mine 50%, and Lakewood Mining 50% reports the discovery by diamond drilling of a Diatreme in the centre of the Wood No. 5 mineral claim located 5 km south of Afton Mine, 12 miles west of Kamloops, B.C. He explains the importance of a Diatreme as, "Diatremes or volcanic vents form where gases expand at explosive rates causing the gases and the rocks to push violently upwards. Numerous well defined Diatreme breccia pipes in northeastern Arizona have been described. They are funnel shaped with a diameter on the surface from a few hundred meters to over one and a half km across. Diatremes form in an area of igneous activity and represent highly porous avenues for the escape of hydrothermal fluids. They are an ideal geological environment for the formation of gold and base metal deposits. The deposits usually form on the periphery of the Diatreme." See sketch of a similar Diatreme overleaf:

The Cripple Creek deposits in Colorado now largely exhausted have produced during their lifetime 20,000,000 ounces of gold. Note the location of the ore deposit in relation to the volcanic vent.

Afton Mine was 30,000,000 tonnes of 1% copper, 0.58 grams/ gold, 4.196 grams silver per tonne. The 11,000 tonne per day mill is now inactive.

The diamond drill hole 91-2 on the Wood No. 5 claims was collared at the center of the IP anomaly and

drilled to the depth of 644 ft. The entire length of the hole, with visible disseminated scattered flakes of native copper. This volcanic breccia has been identified as a diatreme. An EM survey of the anomaly is planned to locate potential conductors for drill testing.
