ECONOMICS FOR A MARBLE - Burkhard Franz, president, Franz QUARRY TO BE EXAMINED Capital Corp., reports a preliminary review of the recently completed 802 meters (2,405 ft.) core drilling at the Kingfisher marble deposit near Enderby, B.C. The drill core appears to be relatively unfractured.

The drilling demonstrates the occurrence of a massive deposit of calcite marble over a drilled strike length of 1,000 m. (3,000 ft.). This unit is made up of about 90% white to light grey marble of which about 50% has been described as good decorative grade considered suitable for marble tiles and slabs and architectural use. The other marble, if too small for block production, will be targeted for the screen grade and landscape markets.

The preliminary drilling confirmed 10,200,000 tonnes. The marble structure is open to extensions. Marble is high grade limestone which if decorative and not fractured is sold in 20 tonne blocks for cutting and polishing into tiles and slabs. Wholesale prices on site for marble are typically \$400/t and for pure white marble as high as \$900/t in block form. Several European companies have expressed their interest in purchasing blocks of marble from Franz Capital. Other uses for the marble include landscape rock and architectural stone, smaller sizes sold as crushed products are generally referred to as screen grade calcite and can be used in a multitude of products. Screen grade calcite sells for prices ranging from \$30/t to \$250/t according to the product for which mining costs are about \$4.00/t.
